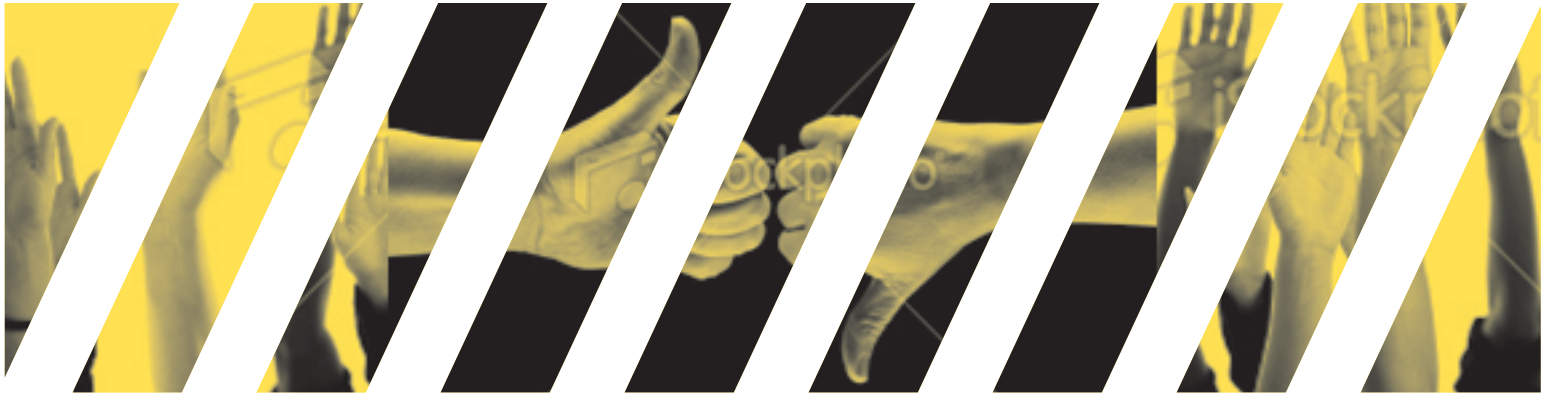

TRACK 1: SAFETY 24/7: BUILDING AN INCIDENT FREE CULTURE

Joe Borello, Northeast District Safety Manager, UPS

Mr. Borello will spend time on the importance of safety in the workplace. UPS is taking safety to a new level; they have added safety to its core values by adding it to the company policy book. Dialogue will be on the styles in the book to change the safety culture and making the right choices.

TRACK 2: BUILDING ACCOUNTABILITY FOR LOCKOUT/TAGOUT: ALWAYS LOCK IT; THERE IS NO TURNING BACK

Anthony Jones, RN, COHN, MEMIC

What is going on? October 31, 1989 general industry and construction were required to comply with OSHA's standard for The Control of Hazardous Energy (Lockout/Tagout), Title 29 CFR Part 1910.147. OSHA's fiscal year 2010 reveals the lockout/tagout standard in the top five for most citations and fines.

This session will focus on what is necessary to maintain lockout compliance. We will also look at required materials; mandatory policies and procedures; required employee training; comprehension by management and employees along with effective enforcement. Information will be provided to help evaluate your own lockout program and determine if you have compliance issues needing control.

TRACK 3: TAILORING YOUR WELLNESS PROGRAM TO CREATE A CULTURE OF WELLNESS

The majority of companies today have some type of employee wellness program. Programs range from online opportunities to wellness challenges, walking programs, wellness fairs and many more initiatives. Many times these programs lack the organization and support to really thrive.

This session will provide essential ingredients for creating the work environment, relationships, policies and initiatives to move from just having a wellness program to having a culture of wellness.

This session will cover changes to the MUTCD, basic work zone set up, and proper flagging techniques, flagging dos and don'ts and the importance of flagging.

This session will discuss the pitfalls of waste management and disposal and how well-meaning decisions without consideration of business risks as well as both state and federal regulations can result in expensive, high profile and career threatening problems. In addition, we will talk about useful tips or warning signs for identifying risky waste management and disposal decisions and real world examples that were expensive, career ending or resulted in imprisonment.

TRACK 1: HOW TO GET YOUR EMPLOYEES TO RECOGNIZE & CORRECT HAZARDS

*Douglas MacDonald, Safety & Health Manager, PSNH & President Elect for SHCNNE
Gerry Breton, Safety Director, Lucas Tree Experts & Board Member for SHCNNE.*

This session will highlight case studies of two successful programs that encourages recognizing and controlling of hazards and near miss reporting. These programs are intended to be proactive in addressing the issues before the incident occurs.

TRACK 2: NFPA 70E: ELECTRICAL SAFETY IN LAYMAN TERMS

William Benard, Manager of Safety and Training, Gemini Electric Inc.

This session will demonstrate the potential of electricity from a perspective of safety and incident prevention with a direction from the speaker that will provide a "bird's eye" view for non-electricians as to just how much respect electricity is due. Video streams capturing Arc Flash occurrences with real life explanations as to how these accidents transpire along with means to prevent them from ever happening will be part of the session. Electrical Safety Awareness has become an important cog in the wheel of facility procedural safety.

The healthcare community is directly affected, as many instances do not lend easily to shutting electrical power whenever work is expected to be completed. This concern relates to more than the professional electrical installation community as the customer and consumer play an important role in the development of safe operating procedures that need to be understood and closely supported. You will come away from this snippet of specialized training with a more complete respect for electricity both in the workplace and in the home as well.

TRACK 3: REDUCING THE POTENTIAL FOR WORKPLACE VIOLENCE

Workplace violence has become an increasing problem where once it was a rare occurrence. Companies need to develop procedures and policies that can be initiated in the event of a workplace violence incident. Not all events come from the outside. Find out how to minimize the potential from within.

TRACK 4: FIRE PREVENTION IN THE OFFICE AND MAINTENANCE GARAGE ENVIRONMENT

Industrial and home fires usually have causes that are simple to identify if you know what you are looking for. However, we take conditions in the office and home for granted that nothing bad will result.

TRACK 1: PERSONAL COURAGE & CONFLICT RESOLUTION ~ WORKPLACE 'GAME CHANGER'!

Sheila Kabat, Vice President, Snowden Associates

Conflict is natural and normal. What do you think causes conflict? How do you feel about conflict? Why do you avoid it? Managing conflict with confidence comes from personal courage and discovering 'common ground'. If you are conflict 'avoidant', then participate in this interactive session and bring your greatest fears about conflict at work.

TRACK 2: OSHA RESPONSIBILITIES FOR SUPERVISORS

David L. Berard, PE, Owner, DB Services

This session will cover the supervisor's responsibilities under the OSHA Act for General Industry. Mr. Berard will go through the OSHA standards and explain what the supervisor is required to do and the documentation needed to comply with the OSHA Act.

TRACK 3: SLIPS, TRIPS & FALLS, CASE STUDIES

Rich Schleckser, Sr. Service Director, Liberty Mutual

Slips, trips and falls on the same level account for 15% of all employee workplace injuries. These exposures also affect customers and visitors to our premises.

Mr. Schleckser will outline the extent of slips, trips and falls (S/T/Fs) in the workplace, describe causes and contributing factors that lead to S/T/F accidents and provide elements of an effective S/T/F prevention process.

The session will cover factors related to floor surface selection guidelines, "Slipperiness" assessments, floor surface treatment options, slip-resistant footwear, and elimination of trip hazards, mat systems, housekeeping programs and common sense solutions to everyday exposures.

TRACK 4: HOW TO HIRE THE RIGHT DRIVER AND KEEP THEM FROM HITTING EVERYTHING

Bruce Thomas, East Region Safety Manager, UPS*

How does UPS select their drivers? More importantly with everything they have to do, find addresses, deliver packages and navigate through the streets, how come they are not involved in crashes? Why do they have the best auto frequency in the transportation industry?

This session will focus on three things; selection, training and management qualifications.

Selection; how does UPS select future drivers? We will go into the detailed process involved in the driver road test that anyone who gets behind the wheel of a UPS vehicle must do first.

Training: No one in the industry puts their drivers through the comprehensive training routine that UPS does. This module will explain what is done from orientation through the seniority process and beyond.

Management Qualification: East Region Safety Manager Bruce Thomas will join in this module to explain the Management Driver Safety Training Program (MDST) that all drivers' supervisor and managers need to go through.

TRACK 5: ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT AS A COLLATERAL DUTY FOR THE SAFETY PROFESSIONAL

Diana Kroner, Lead Environmental and Safety Engineer MITRE Corporation

This session is an environmental management overview for the safety professional. One individual, with expertise in one area (environmental, health, or safety), sometimes manages environmental Health and Safety. It can be a challenge to try to learn a new field, become proficient in it, and keep up with the day-to-day demands of the job.

This session will help you understand the rationale behind the federal environmental regulations and give you a brief overview of the regulations. Discussions in this workshop will include Hazardous Waste Management; Spill Prevention, Control and Countermeasures Plans; and Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Reporting.

Mike Green, President, CEO, Concord Hospital/Capital Region Health Care

TRACK 1: CEO'S WHO GET IT!

Brian Stowell, President, Crown Point Cabinetry

Mr. Stowell will tell you the story of how Crown Point Cabinetry transformed from a company that believed "accidents happens" to becoming a safety first operation.

Attendees will experience the journey that brought Crown Point Cabinetry to where they are today, in addition to sharing stories of risks taken, mistakes they made and lessons learned. These stories will also embrace our adventure in drug testing. Every attendee will discover something to relate to!

TRACK 2: 2012 OSHA UPDATE: WHAT IS NEW?

Rose Obar, Area Director, U.S. Department of Labor/OSHA

This session will discuss New Hampshire Occupational Safety and Health Regulatory Update. This is a great opportunity to ask questions that you wanted to know but were afraid to ask.

TRACK 3: WORK AND WELLNESS: PROTECTING THE WHOLE WORKER

Rich Schleckser, Sr. Service Director, Liberty Mutual

Research continues to show the importance that an employee's general physical and mental health has on controlling workplace injuries and disability duration. The impact of employee "wellness" should be recognized and managed in the workplace through physical, administrative and behavioral control plans. This session will review these issues, meaningful control plans and provide resources for effective program development to protect your organization's most important asset. It will also discuss creative and realistic ways to help employees decide to adopt safe and healthy behaviors at work and at home.

TRACK 4: DISTRACTED DRIVING: HIGHWAYS OR DIEWAYS. WHAT CAN WE DO TO IMPROVE DRIVING BEHAVIORS?

*Geoffrey Doughty, Director of Safety & Loss Control, New Hampshire Motor Transport Association
Glenn Severance, Regional Loss Control Manager, Aim Mutual Insurance*

Driver inattention is a major contributor to highway crashes. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that at least 21% of police-reported crashes involve some form of driver inattention. In 2008, nearly 6,000 people died in crashes involving distracted driving. Distracted driving is a serious, life-threatening practice.

New Hampshire banned text messaging while driving on July 1, but cell phones are still legal to use while driving, and there are plenty of other distractions for both new drivers and those with tens of thousands of miles behind the wheel.

This session will provide an update on the latest regulations and company policies that are aimed at addressing this increasingly dangerous issue.

TRACK 5: WHY IS NOW THE BEST TIME TO BE A SAFETY PERSON?

Herb Parkhurst, P.E., C.E.M., Senior Manager, Plant Services, New Hampshire Ball Bearings, Astro Division

This session will begin with a description of the current business environment and then move into a discussion of the author's views on sustainability and what it means apart from the typical "green" connotations. The discussion would describe sustainability as a culture for adaptation to change, a scalable umbrella that should be adopted at the highest management levels. From here, the session would go on to discuss how most safety and environmental professionals struggle to find justification for projects, and even their jobs.

The focus of the discussion would be on taking a holistic view of business systems and how safety, environmental, productivity, and energy efficiency are actually the same when viewed as process wastes. Techniques will be discussed for making projects that are safer, generate less waste, are more productive and use less energy. This mind set helps gain access to capital money and other resources to fund projects, which might otherwise fail to gain implementation.

TRACK 1: OSHA VOLUNTARY COOPERATIVE PROGRAMS AND THE USE OF SAFETY AND HEALTH INCENTIVE PROGRAMS

James E. Mulligan, Assistant Regional Administrator for Cooperative and State Programs, OSHA

This session will discuss each of OSHA's cooperative safety and health recognition programs, VPP and SHARP. The discussion regarding SHARP and VPP will center on the positive influence the recognition programs have on management and labor. Best practices developed by current participants will be highlighted.

Additionally, the presentation will discuss safety and health incentive programs. Mr. Mulligan will discuss what OSHA believes are positive and negative incentive programs and how they affects the workplace.

TRACK 2: WORKING FROM HEIGHTS "FALL PROTECTION"

This session will cover OSHA Fall Protection requirements. Mr. Berard and Mr. Leithner will cover the standards and the present practical solutions to common fall protection issues. A display and demonstration of typical fall protection equipment will also be included.

TRACK 4: COMPLIANCE, SAFETY, ACCOUNTABILITY (CSA) – GET WITH THE PROGRAM!

Larry Abruzzesa, Division Program Manager, U.S. Dept. of Transportation/Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration

What is CSA and why do I need to know about it? If you operate any Commercial Motor Vehicle over 10,000 lbs. for your business, you are subject to the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations enforced by the USDOT and the NHSP.

You do not have to be a trucking company. These regulations pertain to EVERY company that operates a commercial motor vehicle in the furtherance of a COMMERCIAL ENTERPRISE in intra or interstate commerce.

CSA's objective is to increase safety on the nation's roads – benefiting drivers, companies and the traveling public alike. The program is more detailed and intense than the Safestat Program once used and you will have a greater chance of being contacted by the US Department of Transportation.

Drivers and business owners should know what CSA will mean for them and how they can prepare for this important safety program.

TRACK 5: HAZARDOUS WASTE MANAGEMENT IN HEALTHCARE

Rick Foote, EH&S Compliance Manager, Triumvirate Environmental

Hazardous Waste Management in healthcare has become a major focus of the Environmental Protection Agency and the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services. The regulatory agencies have increased inspections on these facilities with a major focus on pharmaceutical waste management and training.

This session will review the regulatory requirements that you need to be aware of to ensure compliance. We will also review how to prepare for an inspection including protocols and records that should be available.

TRACK 1: GETTING TO YES - BUILDING A BUSINESS CASE FOR SAFETY

Lucy Ryder, CSP, Manager of Training & Product Development, Loss Prevention, Liberty Mutual

Have you ever recommended a risk reduction solution to your manager or customer where they nod and say, "Yes we will do that?" Then, when you follow up, nothing has been implemented? Sound familiar?

Getting to Yes; glean from lessons learned how to develop solutions that will get your safety recommendations implemented. This session will engage attendees in reviewing the results of a real life scenarios and applying them directly to your current work.

Following the training participants should be able to: Identify the influential stakeholders and informal organizations structure in order to obtain a YES! Connect the business value of the business needs to obtain a YES!

TRACK 2: CASE STUDIES ON ELECTRICAL SAFETY: REAL LIFE EXAMPLES

Kenneth Mastrullo, Compliance Assistance Coordinator, U.S. Department of Labor/OSHA

Over 90% of electrical accidents are caused by unsafe work practices. This session will explore the root cause of accidents and injuries. Actual case studies will be presented to exemplify the common mistakes that are made to cause these accidents.

The lessons learned from these case studies will provide an insight into the knowledge and skills necessary to perform work on electrical systems safely. This includes the importance of electrical safety fundamentals and training.

TRACK 3: BACK INJURIES: "THE SECRET" TO ELIMINATING BACK PAIN

Steven Coppola, Doctor of Physical Therapy, Coppola Physical Therapy

The reason people have back pain in epidemic fashion is because they do not know how they get it in the first place. This session with Steven Coppola PT, DPT will show the secrets of how to get back pain and how to prevent it. For most of us, even if we have a disc issue, it is NOT too late.

This engaging speaker will liken back pain to first learning how to drive a car. To not crash a car you need to learn the components, learn how to use the components, and then practice driving the car using the components. Hold onto your car seat and come for the ride.

TRACK 4: FEDERAL MOTOR CARRIER HOURS OF SERVICE

Sgt. Nicole Armaganian, Sergeant, New Hampshire State Police

The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration oversees the enforcement of the rules and regulations of the motor transport industry. Its hours of service regulations are one of the strictest regulations governing the drivers of commercial vehicles in interstate service. These regulations are often the most violated in the industry and confusion in understanding the provisions is bound to be part of the problem, New Hampshire State Police Commercial Vehicle Unit is charged with the enforcement of these regulations on the local level. Attendees in this session will leave with a better and clearer understanding of their responsibilities under the law.

TRACK 5: BUILDING RENOVATIONS - CONSIDERATIONS BEFORE THE PROJECT BEGINS

Melissa B. Bowler, Senior Health & Safety Professional / Client Services, The Scott Lawson Group, Ltd.

About to renovate or demolish an existing building? Be aware of the buildings' potential to contain both accessible (and hidden) contaminants (e.g. Asbestos, Lead, Mold, Mercury, Guano, and PCB's). Awareness of hazardous materials is critical during the planning stages to protect worker health and safety and to avoid project delays, violations and costly citations. This session will provide attendees with awareness of these "budget busters and schedule breakers".
